Media Backgrounder Ringling College Library Association

- TOWN HALL Lecture Series
- Art Lecture Series

Ringling College Library Association, established in 1975, is a not-for-profit organization dedicated to the on-going development of Verman Kimbrough Memorial Library at Ringling College of Art and Design, Sarasota, FL, and acts as a catalyst for the educational growth of students, faculty and community. Each year artists, designers, journalists, students, faculty and community members make more than 100,000 visits to Kimbrough Library. In its 31-year history, the Ringling College Library Association has raised more than \$3.4 million for an endowment funding the purchase of books, periodicals, research materials, on-line services, hand-made artist's books, and scholarships for students at Ringling College of Art and Design.

Membership in the Ringling College Library Association is open to the public. Membership levels range from \$50 for an individual or \$100 per couple, to \$1500 for a life membership. Library Association members receive benefits ranging from priority notification and processing for TOWN HALL subscriptions, to discounts on Ringling College Continuing Studies and Special Programs classes, reduced fees for Art Lecture Series events, check-out privileges at the Verman Kimbrough Memorial Library on the campus of Ringling College of Art and Design, and more. **About Ringling College Library Association's
TOWN HALL Lecture Series**

Ringling College Library Association's primary fundraiser, the TOWN HALL Lecture Series, has a proud 27-year history in Sarasota.

TOWN HALL is run by an all-volunteer committee, the Chair of which sits on the board of the Library Association. TOWN HALL lectures are held at the Van Wezel Performing Arts Hall on Sarasota's beautiful bayfront. Generally speaking, morning lectures begin at 10:00 am and evening lectures start at

7 pm. While the TOWN HALL lectures are held at the Van Wezel, neither the organization nor the event is affiliated with the Van Wezel.

Subscriptions to TOWN HALL are sold for the series and range in price (depending upon seat location) from \$250 - \$600 per seat for the entire series. Different benefits accrue to subscribers at different price levels.

Tickets are sold separately for optional lunches and receptions held in the Van Wezel's Grand Foyer following each lecture. Attendees at these events are often treated to a more intimate experience with the speakers, who may make additional remarks, take questions or just circulate with the guests.

History

In 1981, TOWN HALL's inaugural year, Doris Steltzer, a founding member of the Ringling College Library Association (then known as the Ringling College of Art and Design Library Association) was named as the Chair of the very first TOWN HALL. She invited bandleader Peter Duchin, Nieman-Marcus Chairman Stanley Marcus and international spy Aline, Countess of Romanones to speak. Since then, the TOWN HALL stage has been graced by over 120 world leaders, entertainers, journalists, political pundits, athletes and authors. Speakers have included Jack Anderson, George Plimpton, Robert Kennedy, Jr., Terry Anderson, James Lovell, Ralph Nader, Ken Burns, Carl Bernstein, Prime Minister Benezir Bhutto and Bill Moyers. Prior to the creation of TOWN HALL, the Library Association held a series of different fundraising events, including fashion shows, art tours, and other events. As the Series grew, it quickly developed a reputation for delivery quality speakers on a broad range of topics of interest. Year after year, subscriptions sold rapidly and demand exceeded supply. A milestone of the TOWN HALL Lecture Series was the 2005 decision to expand to include an evening series of lectures. Chair Lydia McIntire asked her speakers to make two speeches, and opened TOWN HALL to a whole new audience of those who were either unavailable to attend daytime lectures, or who could not be accommodated due to ever-increasing demand for tickets. While the morning series continued at the Van Wezel, the first evening series was held at Sarasota High School.

In 2006, TOWN HALL Chair Elizabeth Wery took the step to expand the evening series and move it to the Van Wezel. The success of her vision is apparent, as demand for subscriptions continues to swell.
